Joe LaBelle Director of Programs Impact, Family Network on Disabilities

Joe La Belle is a pioneering figure at the intersection of Al and education, serving as the Director of Programs Impact at Family Network on Disabilities. In Florida, he oversees four key programs and lends his expertise to OSEP-funded Technical Assistance centers, enhancing support for students with disabilities through technology.

Notably, Joe has played a crucial role in advocating for Al's role in education, engaging with the Secretary of Education, presenting to the US Department of Education staff, and sharing insights nationwide. His efforts focus on how Al can personalize learning and increase accessibility, making him a respected voice in the field.

Michael McSheehan is a systems-thinker and implementation specialist. A leader in the field of MTSS and inclusive education, he assists schools and districts to braid multiple initiatives and build coherent approaches to teaching and learning. Michael co-led the Center on Inclusive Education at UNH and helped establish the SWIFT Education Center. Michael founded Evolve & Effect, LLC to collaborate with schools and districts who are asking hard questions and seeking significant change in the education of all students, especially those with disabilities and those who have been historically marginalized.

Marc Purchin Owner, Purchin Consulting

Marc Purchin's goals, education, experience, achievement, reputation and vision combined to prompt the establishment of Purchin Consulting in 1997. Beginning some two decades before that, Marc has personally conducted more than 3,000 mediations, mostly through contracts with the California Special Education Hearing Office, the Department of Developmental Disabilities, several public school districts and numerous non-profit organizations. In addition to that work, he has developed Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) programs for Special Education Local Plan Areas (SELPA) in partnership with Community Advisory Committees (CAC) throughout the state of California.

Marc earned his bachelor's degree at Southern Illinois University, majoring in Speech Communication with an emphasis in Interpersonal Communication and Theatre. He then completed the distinctive Master's in Business Administration (MBA) program in Non-Profit Management offered by American Jewish University (formerly University of Judaism.) That program added him to its faculty in 1996 and has taught courses such as "Conflict Resolution and Negotiation" and "Organizational Development and Leadership". Marc has also taught a "Collaboration" course in the School of Education at Cal State Dominguez Hills.




Jae McQueen, LCSW (presenting at UNC) Assistant Director for Mental Health, Cherry Creek Schools
